We've all been impacted both personally and professionally with the ongoing presence of COVID-19, however it is to the credit of all involved, that ASMTI milestones were achieved this year despite the obstacles. 

Laing O'Rourke Update

We wrap up 2021 with LOR having awarded a total of 127 work packages for design and construction work, worth in the order of \$425 million, since LOR's engagement in 2018. This represents 68% of the total expected 187 work packages.

With COVID-19 restrictions in place over much of the country this year, Central Queensland has been very fortunate to experience minimal restrictions in the region, enabling LOR to remain connected with the community and the industry throughout these tumultuous times.

LOR have hosted numerous industry briefings and participated in regular industry engagement activities including:

- Weekly catch-ups with industry groups such as Capricorn Enterprise, Advance Rockhampton and Master Builders.
- Monthly meetings with the 'Work in Central Queensland' and 'Shoalwater Bay Jobs' platforms - enabling us to keep an eye on potential skills shortages in the region.
- Monthly Industry Breakfasts hosted by 'Advance Rockhampton'.
- Bi-monthly information sessions hosted by Master Builders.
- Quarterly catch-ups with the Capricorn Enterprise Industry
- Quarterly workshops with the 'Construction Skills Queensland Major Project Fund' and other major projects involved with the fund.

LOR have sponsored and presented at several annual events including:

- Capricorn Enterprise Major Projects Forum
- Master Builders 2021 Awards Night
- Gladstone Engineering Alliance Supply Chain Expo

2021 has seen continued development of the relationship between LOR and the Traditional Owners of the SWBTA, the Darumbal people. In the past year, 90 LOR and subcontracting staff have undertaken cultural awareness

training, and up to 5,098 hectares of land was inspected for cultural heritage assessment across the SWBTA expansion area. 60 logs and 40 elbows of trees from the expansion site were provided to Darumbal to make artefacts.

CPB Contractors Update

2021 has seen some exciting progress toward the establishment of GVTA. CPB awarded 24 work packages for site investigations and design services, valued in the order of \$14 million, since their engagement in 2020. In the order of 95% of the value of work packages have been awarded to businesses with operations in the North Queensland region. The design of the future GVTA is now approximately 50% complete, with site and geotechnical investigations also progressing well.

CPB spent much of the year travelling through North Queensland, meeting with interested local industry representatives to discuss future opportunities and to help inform the structuring of packages for major construction works (the delivery phase) of the project.

CPB has attended and/or presented at 47 industry engagements throughout the year, including the ASMTI public information sessions held at Greenvale and Charters Towers in March and June, Defence Hub Industry Breakfasts, Defence forums and 'Meet the Defence Contractor' sessions.

Before major construction works can commence in the development of a new greenfield Defence training area, site investigation activities are required to inform the siting and design of facilities. CPB continues to work with Traditional

Opening of New Development at Shoalwater Bay Training Area


The ASMTI marked an important milestone on 09 November 21, with the opening of a new precinct at SWBTA.

'Precinct A' is one of many developments underway as part of the ASMTI expansion of the existing SWBTA in Central Queensland. The precinct includes the construction of an Urban Operations Live Fire (UOLF) facility. Simulating an urban environment, the UOLF contains ten buildings of varying shapes, three of which will support the use of the close target round when approved. Construction of an additional 'After Action Review Building' is underway, which will provide a space where training outcomes can be reviewed, assessed and debriefed immediately following a training activity. Precinct A will include a Combined Arms Air Land Range and associated Hardened Manoeuvre Corridors providing an area capable of supporting advanced live fire activities, as well as facilities including a vehicle wash point, ammunition transfer point and staging area.

The opening of Precinct A was marked with a traditional smoking ceremony led by Darumbal man, Wade Mann. Traditional Owners of the SWBTA, the Darumbal people, were also represented by Kristina Hatfield and the traditional Darumbal dance group. The event was attended by AIRCDRE Sandy Turner, Director General Force Posture Initiatives (DG FPI), Sean Hawkins, outgoing ASMTI Community Liaison representative and Clare Royal, GVTA Indigenous Liaison

Officer. Representatives from Defence's Project Management / Contract Administration consultant Aurecon, Laing O'Rourke, SWBTA Managing Contractor and local subcontractors Mitcon Projects, Waanyi Shamrock United and RMS Engineering and Construction also participated in the event.

Major Dan Palmer, Acting Project Director, reflected on progress to date. "This is an exciting milestone in the expansion of the SWBTA. Works on the expansion commenced in September 2019 to prepare the area for development and are expected to be completed by mid-2024. Precinct A has been under construction since March 2021 and is scheduled for completion by September 2023. We acknowledge the efforts of LOR and their subcontractors in achieving this milestone".

The smoking ceremony highlighted the enduring partnership between Defence and Darumbal Traditional Owners. An Indigenous Land Use Agreement was signed with the Darumbal people on 02 April 2019.

James Foreman, Project Director at LOR highlighted, "The Smoking Ceremony and Welcome to Country is an important part of how we go to work at Shoalwater Bay. Our relationship with Darumbal has always been valued and we respect this by keeping with the traditions required to be welcomed on country. LOR remain very conscious of keeping to the footprint of our project and respecting the land on which we are operating".

"It is always wonderful to have Defence representatives such as AIRCDRE Sandy Turner in attendance at ceremonies such as these, demonstrating the strong collaboration between Traditional Owners, Defence and contractors", James added.
